

South Coast AQMD Rule Update and Forecast

Local Government & Small Business Assistance Advisory Group January 17, 2025

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2022 Air Quality Management Plan (AQMP)

- AQMPs are blueprints to improve air quality and achieve federal and state air quality standards in the South Coast Air Basin and Coachella Valley
- In 2015, U.S. EPA tightened the ozone air quality standard to 70 parts per billion (ppb), triggering the need to develop an AQMP
- The 2022 AQMP addresses control strategy to meet the ozone standard by 2037
- Approved by Governing Board on December 2, 2022
- The 2022 AQMP and all supporting documents are available online at: http://www.aqmd.gov/2022aqmp






Refinery Fenceline and Community Monitoring (R1180 and R1180.1)
Refinery Flares (R1118)
Large Water Heaters and Small Boilers and Process Heaters (R1146.2)
Freight Rail Yards (R2306)
Municipal Solid Waste Incinerators (R1165)
Electric Generating Equipment (R1135)
Leak Detection and Repair (R463, R1148.1, and R1173)
Motor Vehicle and Mobile Equipment Coating Operations (R1151)
Nitric Acid Tanks (R1159.1)

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Fenceline and Community Monitoring (Rules 1180 and 1180.1)

- Addresses lawsuit that alleged that 40,000barrel exemption in rule was contrary to Health and Safety Code 42705.6
- Requires facilities to:
 - Conduct real-time fenceline monitoring
 - Display-monitoring data and provide notifications when air pollutants are above thresholds
 - Fund community air monitoring operated by South Coast AQMD
- Intent is to measure air pollutants from the petroleum refineries at the fenceline and in surrounding communities



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Control of Emissions from Refinery Flares (Rule 1118)

- Partially implements control measure to reduce emission from petroleum refineries
 - 2022 AQMP: L-CMB-07
- Achieves four out of seven AB 617 CERP objectives for WCWLB community
- Lower SO₂ performance target for refinery flares
- New NOx performance target for hydrogen plants flares
- New annual throughput limit for Liquified Petroleum Gas (LPG) clean service flares
- Increases mitigation fees and ties them to the annual consumer price index
- Additional flare reporting requirements



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Large Water Heaters and Small Boilers and Process Heaters (Rule 1146.2)

- Implements control measure to reduce NOx emissions from large water heaters and small boilers and process heaters through replacement with zero-emission appliances
 - 2022 AQMP: Control Measure C-CMB-01
- Requires zero-emission NOx appliances for future implementation dates for new installations
- Provides alternative compliance options to address challenges
- Status Update/Technology Check-In 2027



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Freight Rail Yards Indirect Source Rule (Rule 2306)

- Implements:
 - Control Measure MOB-02 from 2022 and 2016 AQMPs to address rail yard emissions
 - Actions in multiple AB 617 CERP objectives for rail yardadjacent EJ communities
- Sets NOx emission reductions targets to ensure reductions at facility level, while providing multiple compliance pathways
- Requires regular reporting of zero emission infrastructure planning, development, and utilization
- Effective upon U.S. EPA approval/inclusion of Rule 2306 into SIP and waiver/authorization for CARB rules affecting freight rail yard emission sources



Rule 316.2
Companion fee rule to recover reasonable costs from implementing Rule 2306

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Control of Emissions from Municipal Solid Waste Incinerators (Rule 1165)

- Implements two control measures to reduce NOx and PM emissions from municipal solid waste incinerators by 2029
 - 2022 AQMP: Control Measure L-CMB-09
 - Attainment Plan for the 2012 Annual PM2.5 Standard: Control Measure BCM-07
- Places limits on types of waste allowed to be combusted to minimize toxics emissions




- Requires continuous monitoring and annual source testing
- Limits the duration of startup and shutdown events

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Electric Generating Equipment (Rule 1135)

- Partially implements control measure to reduce NOx emission from electricity generating facilities
 - 2022 AQMP: L-CMB-06
- Updates NOx emission caps for electric generating units on Santa Catalina Island
- Requires the removal of legacy engines
- Limits the amount and size of new diesel engines
- Requires equipment installed after 2028 to be near-zero emission or zero-emission



Leak Detection and Repair (Rules 463, 1148.1, and 1173)

- Partially implements 2022 AQMP Measure FUG-01 and CERP objectives to address fugitive emissions at petroleum facilities and oil and gas production sites
- Requires the use of optical gas imaging (OGI) to finds leaks more quickly
- Reduces the leak standard and streamlines the repair schedule
- Incorporates other best management practices



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Motor Vehicle and Mobile Equipment Coating Operations (Rule 1151)

- Establishes VOC limits for coatings applied to motor vehicles and mobile equipment
- Partially implements control measure from 2022 AQMP:
 - Phases out two toxic and carcinogenic compounds:
 - 1. para-Chlorobenzotrifluoride (pCBtF)
 - 2. tert-Butyl Acetate (t-BAc)
 - Achieves additional VOC reductions of 0.19 tpd
- Fulfills AB 617 South Los Angeles Community Emissions Reduction Plan objective to reduce emissions from autobody shops



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Nitric Acid Tanks (Rule 1159.1)

- Partially implements 2022 AQMP
 Control Measure L-CMB-01 to reduce
 NOx emissions from RECLAIM facilities
- Last landing rule for RECLAIM transition
- Reduces NOx emissions from nitric acid tanks by 2029
 - Alternative compliance pathways for tanks with NOx emissions 0.60 lb/hr or less

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RULE 1109.1: EMISSIONS OF OXIDES OF NITROGEN FROM PETROLEUM REFINERIES AND RELATED OPERATIONS

- Purpose : Reduce NOx from refinery operations
- Adopted in November 2021
- Refinery operators required to directly meet emission limits or submit an alternative implementation plan (I-Plan)
- To date refinery operators have submitted 19 permit applications and are implementing I-Plans
- Staff provides periodic updates to Stationary Source Committee on implementation of Rule 1109.1n targets.



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RULE 1118: CONTROL OF EMISSIONS FROM REFINERY FLARES



- Purpose: Monitor and record data on refinery and related flaring operations, and to control and minimize flaring and flare-related emissions
- Amended in April 2024 requiring:
 - Meet target of 0.5 tons of SO₂ per million barrels by 2025
 - Meet annual performance target of 0.3 pounds of NOx emissions per Hydrogen production capacity of plant
 - Starting January 1, 2025, submit a monthly report through the Flare Event Notification System (FENS), approved by the Executive Officer or designee, within 30 days after the end of each month

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RULE 1180 and 1180.1: FENCELINE AND COMMUNITY AIR MONITORING FOR PETROLEUM REFINERIES, RELATED FACILITIES AND OTHER REFINERIES



- Purpose: Require Real-Time Fenceline Air Monitoring Systems and to establish a fee schedule to fund refinery-related community air monitoring systems that provide air quality information to the public.
- Adopted in January 2024
- The deadline to pay the applicable installation fee for the community air monitoring systems is January 31, 2025. The fee schedule is outlined in Table 2 of Rule 1180 and 1180.1.

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
RULE 1111: REDUCTION OF NOx EMISSIONS FROM NATURAL GAS- FIRED, FAN-TYPE CENTRAL FURNACES

- Purpose: Reduce NOx emissions from natural gas furnaces
- Applies to manufacturers, distributors, sellers, and installers of residential and commercial fan-type central furnaces
- Last amended in September 2023
- Mitigation Fee Option for manufacturers of fan-type central furnaces for mobile homes who elected to pay a per-unit fee instead of meeting the 14 nanogram/Joule NOx emission standard will end on September 30, 2025



RULE 1168: ADHESIVE AND SEALANT APPLICATIONS

- Purpose: Reduce emissions of VOCs, toxic air contaminants, and stratospheric ozone-depleting compounds from the application of adhesives, adhesive primers, sealants, and sealant primers
- Last amended in November 2022
- Manufacturers and retailers must submit a Quantity and Emissions Report to South Coast AQMD
- The deadlines for reporting years 2023 and 2024 are May 1, 2025, for big box retailers and September 1, 2025, for manufacturers and private labelers
- Additionally, starting January 1, 2025, it is prohibited to manufacture, supply, sell, offer for sale, or use single-ply roof material adhesives, single-ply roof membrane adhesives, roof sealants, and primers within the South Coast AQMD if they contain more than 0.01 percent by weight of either para-chlorobenzotrifluoride (pCBtF) or tert-Butyl acetate (t-Bac)



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RULE 1405: CONTROL OF ETHYLENE OXIDE EMISSIONS FROM STERILIZATION AND RELATED OPERATIONS

ethylene Oxide H C C H

- Purpose: Reduce Ethylene Oxide emissions from Sterilization and related operations and to collect information from warehouses receiving materials sterilized with Ethylene Oxide
- Last amended in December 2023
- Operators of any facility performing ethylene oxide sterilization, as well as post-aeration storage facilities, Tier I warehouses, and Tier II warehouses, must conduct a source test to demonstrate compliance, and implement a Leak Detection and Repair (LDAR) program
- Permit applications are due by September 1, 2025

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RULE 2305: WAREHOUSE INDIRECT SOURCE RULE – WAREHOUSE ACTIONS AND INVESTMENTS TO REDUCE EMISSIONS (WAIRE) PROGRAM

- Purpose: Reduce local and regional emissions of NOx and PM and to facilitate local and regional emission reductions associated with warehouses and the mobile sources attracted to warehouses
- Adopted in May 2021
- All warehouse operators with greater than or equal to 100,000 square feet of indoor space are required to submit an Annual WAIRE Report documenting their compliance in 2024 by January 31, 2025


