- 4. **GOOD CAUSE:** Explain why your petition was not filed in sufficient time to issue the required public notice. (Required only for Emergency and Interim Variances; see Attachment A, Item 4)

This variance is in regards to an emergency generator that will run past its allotted 200 emergency hours for the 2024 year on Keller Peak. Due to the State of Emergency caused by a fire, the generator tripped on due to several Edison power poles and conductors being damaged by the fire. With the severity of the fire, Edison nor San Bernardino County (SBCo.) can get up the mountain until the roads are cleared. Due to the fire, the GPS unit was unable to properly communicate with our system to tell SBCo. when the generator was approaching and had passed 200 hours. Since SBCo. generator services was unable to get to the generator to see the hours and SBCo. was relying on the GPS unit to communicate, we were unable to inform SCAQMD before the 200 hours were hit.

- 5. Briefly describe the type of business and processes at your facility.

This emergency generator is on top of Keller Peak and runs the 800 MHz radio tower for the County of San Bernardino First Responders. This radio tower is crucial for first responder communication as well as communication for all County of San Bernardino employees. This emergency generator is there to run when the power supplied by Edison cuts out. Unfortunately, Fleet Management is at the mercy of Edison going up onto Keller Peak and fixing the poles to fix the power supply.

This emergency generator is crucial to the radio tower so that it may have a power source while Edison is having a power outage. This emergency generator is keeping the radio tower online so that it may be used by first responders and other SBCo. employees as a main line of communication. With no generator up on Keller Peak, there is no emergency power supply while Edison is preparing to fix the poles and wires.

SBCo. is unable to comply with the 200 emergency hours rule because the power supply has been damaged by the fire. As stated above, SBCo. is at the mercy of Edison and when they will go up on Keller Peak to fix the power supply of the poles and wires. The power outage occurred on Monday, September 9th, due to the recent fire. Edison oversees assessing the situation and resolving the power problem. Since Edison has informed SBCo. that they will not go up the mountain at Keller Peak until the firefighting aircraft is no longer flying, SBCo. must keep the generator running to power our radio tower. As stated above, the radio tower is crucial to first responder communication and County of San Bernardino employee communication.

15. When and how did you first become aware that you would not be in compliance with the rule(s) and/or permit condition(s)? Provide specific event(s) and date(s) of occurrence(s).

SBCo. was made aware on Sunday, September 15th in the afternoon that Edison had surveyed the site and found numerous poles burned along with conductors being damaged. As stated prior, SBCo. is at the mercy of Edison. Unfortunately, SBCo. was unable to access the site and was having issues communicating with the site due to the fire. Currently the Generator has 228 hours and counting. Fleet Management is getting this petition in as early as possible with the knowledge given.

Considering this emergency generator is only used in cases of emergency, SBCo. is already taking action to keep the emergency generator running only when necessary.

22. How do you plan to monitor or quantify emission levels from the equipment or activity(s) during the variance period, and to make such records available to the District? **Any proposed monitoring does not relieve RECLAIM facilities from applicable missing data requirements.**

SBCo. has a GPS system on the generator calculating how many hours it is running. Based upon the hours and excess emissions factors, SBCo. will calculate the excess emissions from both using the excess emissions calculations provided to me from previous variances. After the fire, the GPS should present more accurate information.

23. How do you intend to achieve compliance with the rule(s) and/or permit condition(s)? Include a detailed description of any equipment to be installed, modifications or process changes to be made, permit conditions to be amended, etc., dates by which the actions will be completed, and an estimate of total costs.

Since Fleet Management is only requesting to have the variance for the 2023 year, Fleet Management will try to keep the emergency hours under 200 hours for the foreseeable future. Unfortunately, this is not something that Fleet Management can predict. While the emergency generator is only on during an emergency, Fleet can only hope that Edison can fix their power supply quickly so that Fleet will not need to apply for a variance again.

2. THIS EQUIPMENT SHALL BE PROPERLY MAINTAINED AND KEPT IN GOOD OPERATING CONDITION AT ALL TIMES.
3. A NON-RESETTABLE TOTALIZING TIMER SHALL BE INSTALLED AND MAINTAINED TO INDICATE THE ENGINE ELAPSED OPERATING TIME.
4. THIS ENGINE SHALL NOT OPERATE MORE THAN 200 HOURS IN ANY ONE YEAR, WHICH INCLUDES NO MORE THAN 50 HOURS IN ANY ONE YEAR FOR MAINTENANCE AND TESTING PURPOSES AND NO MORE THAN 4.2 HOURS IN ANY ONE MONTH FOR MAINTENANCE AND TESTING PURPOSES.
5. AN ENGINE OPERATING LOG OF ENGINE OPERATIONS SHALL BE KEPT AND MAINTAINED DOCUMENTING THE TOTAL TIME THE ENGINE IS OPERATED EACH MONTH AND THE SPECIFIC REASON FOR OPERATION AS:
 - A. EMERGENCY USE
 - B. MAINTENANCE AND TESTING
 - C. OTHER (BE SPECIFIC)IN ADDITION, FOR EACH TIME THE ENGINE IS MANUALLY STARTED, THE LOG SHALL INCLUDE THE DATE OF ENGINE OPERATION, THE SPECIFIC REASON FOR OPERATION, AND THE TOTALIZING HOUR METER READING (IN HOURS AND TENTHS OF HOURS) AT THE BEGINNING AND THE END OF THE OPERATION.

B. THE TOTAL HOURS OF ENGINE OPERATION FOR MAINTENANCE AND TESTING FOR THE PREVIOUS CALENDAR YEAR.
7. ENGINE OPERATION LOG(S) SHALL BE RETAINED ON SITE FOR A MINIMUM OF FIVE CALENDAR YEARS AND SHALL BE MADE AVAILABLE TO THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER OR REPRESENTATIVE UPON REQUEST.
8. THE OPERATOR SHALL NOT PURCHASE ANY DIESEL FUEL UNLESS THE FUEL IS LOW SULFUR DIESEL FOR WHICH THE SULFUR CONTENT DOES NOT EXCEED 15 PPM BY WEIGHT. EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2006, THE OPERATOR SHALL ONLY USE DIESEL FUEL WITH A SULFUR CONTENT THAT DOES NOT EXCEED 15 PPM BY WEIGHT, UNLESS THE OPERATOR DEMONSTRATES IN WRITING TO THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER THAT SPECIFIC ADDITIONAL TIME IS NECESSARY.
9. OPERATION BEYOND THE 50 HOURS PER YEAR ALLOTTED FOR ENGINE MAINTENANCE AND TESTING SHALL BE ALLOWED ONLY IN THE EVENT OF A LOSS OF GRID POWER OR UP TO 30 MINUTES PRIOR TO A ROTATING OUTAGE, PROVIDED THAT: (A) THE UTILITY DISTRIBUTION COMPANY HAS ORDERED ROTATING OUTAGES IN THE CONTROL AREA WHERE THE ENGINE IS LOCATED OR HAS INDICATED THAT IT EXPECTS TO ISSUE SUCH AN ORDER AT A CERTAIN TIME; AND (B) THE ENGINE IS LOCATED IN A UTILITY SERVICE BLOCK THAT IS SUBJECT TO THE ROTATING OUTAGE. ENGINE OPERATION SHALL BE TERMINATED IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE UTILITY DISTRIBUTION COMPANY ADVISES THAT A ROTATING OUTAGE IS NO LONGER IMMINENT OR IN EFFECT.
10. THIS ENGINE SHALL NOT BE USED AS PART OF AN INTERRUPTIBLE SERVICE CONTRACT IN WHICH A FACILITY RECEIVES A PAYMENT OR REDUCED RATES IN RETURN FOR REDUCING ELECTRICAL LOAD ON THE GRID WHEN REQUESTED TO DO SO BY THE UTILITY OR THE GRID OPERATOR.
11. THIS ENGINE SHALL BE A US EPA CERTIFIED, NON-ROAD COMPRESSION-IGNITION ENGINE, AS EVIDENCED BY THE MANUFACTURER'S ENGINE TAG.

PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY

WHEREAS on September 5, 2024, the Line Fire began burning in San Bernardino County and has since burned over 7,000 acres; and

WHEREAS the Line Fire has prompted evacuation orders and road closures, and continues to threaten structures, homes, critical infrastructure, endangered species, watersheds, and cultural and heritage resources; and

WHEREAS continued high temperatures throughout the day and night, dry conditions, and strong winds have increased the intensity and spread of the Line Fire, causing imminent threat to life, with an Excessive Heat Warning in effect in San Bernardino County; and

WHEREAS in response to a request from the Office of Emergency Services, the Federal Emergency Management Agency approved a Fire Management Assistance Grant to assist with the mitigation, management, and control of the Line Fire; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of Government Code section 8558(b), I find that conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property exist due to the Line Fire in San Bernardino County; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of Government Code section 8558(b), I find that the conditions caused by the Line Fire, by reason of their magnitude, are beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of any single local government and require the combined forces of a mutual aid region or regions to appropriately respond; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of Government Code section 8625(c), I find that local authorities are inadequate to cope with the magnitude of the damage caused by the Line Fire; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of Government Code section 8571, I find that strict compliance with various statutes and regulations specified in this Proclamation would prevent, hinder, or delay the mitigation of the effects of the Line Fire.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GAVIN NEWSOM, Governor of the State of California, in accordance with the authority vested in me by the State Constitution and statutes, including the California Emergency Services Act, and in particular, Government Code section 8625, **HEREBY PROCLAIM A STATE OF EMERGENCY** to exist in San Bernardino County due to the Line Fire.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

1. All agencies of the state government utilize and employ state personnel, equipment, and facilities for the performance of any and all activities consistent with the direction of the Office of Emergency Services and the State Emergency Plan. Also, all residents are to obey

the direction of emergency officials with regard to this emergency in order to protect their safety.

2. The Office of Emergency Services shall provide assistance to local governments, if appropriate, under the authority of the California Disaster Assistance Act, Government Code section 8680 et seq., and California Code of Regulations, Title 19, section 2900 et seq.
3. As necessary to assist local governments and for the protection of public health and the environment, state agencies shall enter into contracts to arrange for the procurement of materials, goods, and services necessary to quickly assist with the response to and recovery from the impacts of the Line Fire. Applicable provisions of the Government Code and the Public Contract Code, including but not limited to travel, advertising, and competitive bidding requirements, are suspended to the extent necessary to address the effects of the Line Fire.
4. The California National Guard may be mobilized under Military and Veterans Code section 146 to support disaster response and relief efforts, as directed by the Office of Emergency Services, and to coordinate with all relevant state agencies and state and local emergency responders and law enforcement within the impacted areas. Sections 147 and 188 of the Military and Veterans Code are applicable during the period of participation in this mission, exempting the California Military Department from applicable procurement rules for specified emergency purchases, and those rules are hereby suspended.
5. The provisions of Unemployment Insurance Code section 1253 imposing a one-week waiting period for unemployment insurance applicants are suspended as to all applicants who are unemployed as a direct result of the Line Fire in San Bernardino County and apply for unemployment insurance benefits during the time period beginning September 5, 2024, and ending on the close of business on March 5, 2025, in San Bernardino County and who are otherwise eligible for unemployment insurance benefits.
6. In order to ensure hospitals, clinics, and other health facilities remain open, the Director of the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) may waive any of the licensing requirements of Chapters 1, 2, 8, and 8.5 of Division 2 of the Health and Safety Code and accompanying regulations with respect to any hospital, clinic, other health facility, home health agency, or hospice agency identified in Health and Safety Code sections 1200, 1250, 1727, or 1746 that is impacted by the Line Fire. Any waiver shall include alternative measures that, under the circumstances, will allow the facilities to remain open while protecting public health and safety. Any health facilities or agencies being granted a waiver shall be established and operated in accordance with their disaster and mass casualty plan or emergency preparedness plan. Any waivers granted pursuant to this paragraph shall be posted on the CDPH website and shall be in effect only so long as necessary to address the direct impacts of the Line Fire in San Bernardino County.

7. In order to directly respond to the needs of impacted adult and senior care facilities, child care facilities, children's residential facilities, resource family homes, home care organizations, and other similar care facilities and care providers within the California Department of Social Services' (CDSS) jurisdiction, the Director of CDSS may waive any provisions of the Family Code, Health and Safety Code, or Welfare and Institutions Code, and accompanying regulations or written directives, with respect to the use, licensing, certification, registration or approval of care providers, facilities or homes within CDSS jurisdiction set forth in the California Community Care Facilities Act (Health and Safety Code section 1500 et seq.), Child Care Provider Registration (Health and Safety Code section 1596.60 et seq.), the California Child Day Care Facilities Act (Health and Safety Code section 1596.70 et seq.), Residential Care Facilities for Persons With Chronic Life-Threatening Illness (Health and Safety Code section 1568.01 et seq.), the California Residential Care Facilities for the Elderly Act (Health and Safety Code section 1569 et seq.), Medical Foster Homes for Veterans (Health and Safety Code section 1568.21 et seq.), Continuing Care Contracts (Health and Safety Code section 1770 et seq.), the Home Care Services Consumer Protection Act (Health and Safety Code section 1796.10 et seq.), and the Resource Family Approval Program (Welfare and Institutions Code section 16519.5 et seq.). Any waivers granted pursuant to this paragraph shall be posted on the CDSS website and shall be in effect only so long as necessary to address the direct impacts of the Line Fire in San Bernardino County.

8. In order to directly respond to the needs of behavioral health programs and facilities impacted by the Line Fire, including alcohol and other drug programs, adult alcoholism or drug abuse recovery or treatment facilities, driving-under-the-influence programs, narcotic treatment programs, psychiatric health facilities, mental health rehabilitation centers, social rehabilitation programs, skilled nursing facilities with special treatment programs, Lanterman-Petris-Short designated facilities, community treatment facilities, short term residential therapeutic programs, and children's crisis residential programs, the Director of the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) may waive any licensing, certification, or approval requirements for such programs under its jurisdiction set forth in Welfare and Institutions Code, Divisions 4, 5 and 9 and in Health and Safety Code, Divisions 2 and 10.5, and accompanying regulations, written standards, or information notices. Any waivers granted pursuant to this paragraph shall be posted on the DHCS website and shall only be in effect so long as necessary to address the direct impacts of the Line Fire in San Bernardino County.


9. Health and Safety Code sections 103525.5 and 103625, and Penal Code section 14251, requiring the imposition of fees, are suspended with regard to any request for copies of certificates of birth, death, marriage, and dissolution of marriage records, by any individual who loses such records as a result of the Line Fire in San Bernardino County. Such copies shall be provided without charge.

I FURTHER DIRECT that as soon as hereafter possible, this Proclamation be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State and that widespread publicity and notice be given of this Proclamation.

This Proclamation is not intended to, and does not, create any rights or benefits, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity, against the

State of California, its agencies, departments, entities, officers, employees, or any other person.
